

SHORT ON TIME ? NEED A STRETCH ?

If your travel plans find you short on time, stop at the Mining Heritage and the Forest Fire Walking Trails.

These easy walking paths take you through the area's great mining history and the role wildfire plays in the forest's life.

More indepth information about Greenstone's heritage can be obtained at the *discoverGeraldton* Interpretive Centre directly across the highway.

HOW TO FIND THE Mining Heritage and the Forest Fire Walking Trails



Travelling East on Highway 11

Turn right onto Hardrock Drive at the mining headframe and take the first left into the parking area.

Travelling West on Highway 11

Turn left onto Hardrock Drive at the mining headframe and take the first left into the parking area.



HOW TO FIND THE TRAIL

Interpretive Centre Trail Entrance

While travelling on Highway 11, turn North onto Michael Power Boulevard (Highway 584) then take the first right turn onto Barrick Drive. The trail entrance is located on the top of the hill, with ample parking at the *discoverGeraldton* Interpretive Centre.

Rosedale Point Road Trail Entrance

Travelling along Michael Power Boulevard (Highway 584) turn east on Rosedale Point Road. The trail entrance and parking area are approximately 20m (21 yards) on the right.

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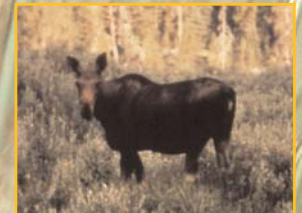

Barrick Drive

Community of Geraldton

Continue north along Michael Power Boulevard (Highway 584) and you will enter the community of Geraldton. There are over 90 businesses and services to meet your needs.

Michael Power Boulevard

Rosedale Point Entrance

The north entrance to the trail can be accessed by turning onto Rosedale Point Road and taking the first right.

Hunting Raptors

The first section of the trail travels along the upper tailings where raptors such as the American Kestrel and Northern Harrier can be seen hunting small rodents and birds.



Marsh Life

The trail crosses through the marsh and offers an excellent opportunity to view Moose, Muskrat, Beaver, or the Great Blue Heron.

Shoreline Residents

The viewing platform provides a place to sit and enjoy the cool breeze blowing off the lake. During your rest you have a chance to view a variety of waterfowl.



Kenogamisis Lake

The lake is a rather large water body covering an area of 41.7 square kilometers (16.1 square miles). The lake is very fertile and supports a wide variety of fish species including Walleye, Northern Pike, White Fish, and Perch.
