Municipal Solid Waste Disposal Plan Environmental Assessment Terms of Reference

Date November 5, 2013

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1. Introduction

The Municipality of Greenstone (Municipality) includes the incorporated towns of Geraldton, Longlac, Nakina, and Beardmore, the unincorporated villages of Jellicoe and Caramat, as well as a considerable portion of the unorganized rural area. The Municipality extends more than 200 km along the Trans Canada Highway 11 and covers an area in excess of 3,000 km².

The Greenstone Region is also home to several Aboriginal communities, including Aroland, Ginoogaming, Long Lake #58, Sand Point, Rocky Bay, and Lake Nipigon Ojibway.

According to Statistics Canada, in 2011, the Municipality had a population of 4,724 (not including the Aboriginal communities).

The Municipality operates four municipal sanitary landfill sites in the communities of Geraldton, Longlac, Nakina and Beardmore. The Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) owned three rural landfill sites in the area, which were operated by the municipality, but these sites were closed effective September 30, 2010.

The landfill site in Geraldton was recently found to be out of compliance with the existing Certificate of Approval (C of A) for exceeding both the approved disposal area (waste footprint) and the approved waste volume. The Municipality initiated the Ministry of the Environment's (MOE) Environmental Screening Process in November 2008 with the intention to request an amendment to the C of A with respect to the capacity of the existing landfill. The final Environmental Screening Report (ESR) has been completed, and a Notice of Completion (NOC) was issued May 1, 2013. The NOC noted that the ESR process did not identify any disadvantages of the landfill expansion that might preclude its formal approval, and that the Municipality intends to submit an application to the MOE to amend the C of A accordingly (now called an Environmental Compliance Approval or ECA). The ESR will be part of the supporting documentation for the application, which if accepted would allow the current site to operate until approximately May 2014.

In light of the recent closures of the MNR landfill sites and capacity issues at the Geraldton landfill, the Municipality recognizes that a long term solution to the management of solid waste is required. The immediate need is to service the community of Geraldton and eventually to service the other communities within the Municipality.

The Municipality is planning to conduct an Environmental Assessment (EA) to review alternative options for municipal solid waste management within the Municipality. The Municipality is currently undertaking a study to develop and receive Ministry of the Environment approval for a Terms of Reference (TOR) in accordance with the Ontario EA Act (EAA). The TOR will establish the framework for conducting the EA.

2. Environmental Assessment Planning Process

This EA process will involve the evaluation of alternatives for the disposal of the Municipality's residual waste, followed by the evaluation of potential sites for the preferred residual waste management alternative (i.e., disposal, treatment or transfer facility).



The process will begin with the preparation of the TOR. Once approved by the Minister of Environment, the TOR will describe the process to be followed during the EA. Legislation requires that consultation with the public, Aboriginal communities and agencies be conducted throughout the EA process, including the development of the TOR.

This TOR has been prepared in accordance with the Ministry of the Environment Code of Practices titled *Preparing and Reviewing Environmental Assessments in Ontario* (October 2009) and *Preparing and Reviewing Terms of Reference for Environmental Assessments in Ontario* (October 2009), as well as the following sections of the EAA:

Terms of reference

6. (1) The proponent shall give the Ministry proposed terms of reference governing the preparation of an environmental assessment for the undertaking. 1996, c. 27, s. 3.

Same

- (2) The proposed terms of reference must,
- (a) indicate that the environmental assessment will be prepared in accordance with the requirements set out in subsection 6.1 (2);
- (b) indicate that the environmental assessment will be prepared in accordance with such requirements as may be prescribed for the type of undertaking the proponent wishes to proceed with; or
- (c) set out in detail the requirements for the preparation of the environmental assessment. 1996, c. 27, s. 3.

Same

(3) The proposed terms of reference must be accompanied by a description of the consultations by the proponent and the results of the consultations. 1996, c. 27, s. 3.

Preparation of environmental assessment

6.1 (1) The proponent shall prepare an environmental assessment for an undertaking in accordance with the approved terms of reference. 1996, c. 27, s. 3.

Contents

- (2) Subject to subsection (3), the environmental assessment must consist of,
- (a) a description of the purpose of the undertaking;
- (b) a description of and a statement of the rationale for,
 - (i) the undertaking,
 - (ii) the alternative methods of carrying out the undertaking, and
 - (iii) the alternatives to the undertaking;
- (c) a description of,
 - (i) the environment that will be affected or that might reasonably be expected to be affected, directly or indirectly,
 - (ii) the effects that will be caused or that might reasonably be expected to be caused to the environment, and



- (iii) the actions necessary or that may reasonably be expected to be necessary to prevent, change, mitigate or remedy the effects upon or the effects that might reasonably be expected upon the environment,
- by the undertaking, the alternative methods of carrying out the undertaking and the alternatives to the undertaking;
- (d) an evaluation of the advantages and disadvantages to the environment of the undertaking, the alternative methods of carrying out the undertaking and the alternatives to the undertaking; and
- (e) a description of any consultation about the undertaking by the proponent and the results of the consultation. 1996, c. 27, s. 3.

Exception

(3) The approved terms of reference may provide that the environmental assessment consist of information other than that required by subsection (2). 1996, c. 27, s. 3.

As this project is in the early stages of the planning process, it will follow subsections 6(2)(a) and 6.1(2) of the EAA.

Documentation of the EA will comply with the regulations as set out under Ontario Regulation (O.Reg.) 334, Section 2 under the EAA:

- 2. (1) An environmental assessment submitted to the Minister shall contain, in addition to the information required under subsection 6.1 (2) of the Act,
 - (a) a brief summary of the environmental assessment organized in accordance with the matters set out in subsection 6.1 (2) of the Act;
 - (b) a list of studies and reports which are under the control of the proponent and which were done in connection with the undertaking or matters related to the undertaking;
 - (c) a list of studies and reports done in connection with the undertaking or matters related to the undertaking of which the proponent is aware and that are not under the control of the proponent;
 - (d) where the environmental assessment is for an undertaking with a fixed location, at least two unbound, well marked, legible and reproducible maps that are an appropriate size to fit on a 215 millimetre by 280 millimetre page, showing the location of the undertaking and the area to be affected by it. R.R.O. 1990, Reg. 334, s. 2 (1); O. Reg. 263/07, s. 1.
- (2) Of the maps referred to in clause (1) (d), one shall be a simplified base map suitable for reproduction in any notices that may be published and the other may include more detail such as a 1:10,000 scale Ontario Base Map. R.R.O. 1990, Reg. 334, s. 2(2).
- (3) The maps referred to in clause (1) (d) may show alternative proposals. R.R.O. 1990, Reg. 334, s. 2 (3).




Figure 2.1: Environmental Assessment Process

The EA process to be followed is illustrated in Figure 2.1 (following page).

3. Identification of the Proponent

4. Purpose and Description of the Proposed Undertaking

The purpose of the proposed undertaking is to create a long term (20 to 30 year) plan for the disposal of the Municipality's solid waste. The plan will be created through the EA process, which will be used to review and screen alternative disposal options for the Municipality.

The EA is required because the Municipality's landfill site in Geraldton Ward could reach capacity by Spring 2014. While the Municipality operates three other municipal landfill sites, they do not have sufficient remaining capacity to be a long term disposal solution for the entire Municipality. A long term solution for managing the Municipality's solid waste is needed. The Municipality needs to continue servicing the waste disposal needs for the community of Geraldton, with service being extended to the other communities within the Municipality in the long term.

This purpose and description of the proposed undertaking is considered preliminary and will be confirmed or updated at the start of the EA process.

Table 4.1 estimates the amount of waste generated for the Municipality to 2045, assuming a negative annual population growth rate, based on Statistics Canada census data. In light of the potential economic development resulting from the proposed Ring of Fire mining developments, population projections included in the Greenstone Grow Plan suggest an increase in the Municipality's population, should the development proceed. The population projections for each community will need to be reviewed during the course of the EA process.

6. Alternatives to be Evaluated

6.1 "Alternatives to" the Undertaking

Table 6.1 describes the alternatives for managing residual waste that will be evaluated during the EA process.

Table 6.1: Alternatives to the Undertaking

Alternative	Description
Thermal Processing	Thermal processing involves the conversion of solid waste to energy, most often through a combustion process. This energy can be captured and used to generate electricity or heat, depending on the process used. While some residual waste would require disposal, this alternative would minimize that amount.
Biological Processing	Biological treatment involves the use of micro-organisms such as aerobic and anaerobic bacteria to break down and stabilize the organic portion of the waste stream. There is the potential to capture biogas in this process, which can be used to generate energy. The residual waste will require landfill disposal.
Landfill Expansion	Expand one or more of the Municipality's existing landfills to enable it to receive more waste in the future, specifically, all of the Municipality's residual waste. This could include either a vertical or horizontal expansion.
Waste Diversion and Waste Re-use	Waste can be diverted from disposal through a broad range of waste diversion and waste re-use programs. Waste not diverted will require disposal.
New Landfill	Site a new landfill. Landfilling is one of the most common and readily available used forms of disposing of residual waste.
Export of Waste	If no method of managing the Municipality's residual waste stream is available within the Municipality's borders, then waste could be sent to another private or municipal facility for disposal.
Do nothing	Maintain the status quo and continue with current disposal activities. This alternative is included in the evaluation of alternatives to provide a benchmark against which the other alternatives may be measured.

6.2 "Alternative Methods" for the Undertaking

Once the preferred "Alternative to" (or combination thereof) has been selected, then sites (or "Alternative Methods") for the preferred option will be explored. If a landfill expansion is the preferred Alternative To, then the evaluation will consider a vertical expansion and/or horizontal expansion. A background report will be prepared confirming the proposed process and its rationale for siting the preferred alternative. The siting requirements will vary depending on the alternative selected.



The site selection process will occur over seven steps, which are outlined in Table 6.2.

3	Refinement of constraint map	"Long list" of candidate sites

5	Site investigations of short-listed candidate sites	Background site reports
6	Evaluation/comparison of short-listed candidate sites	Preferred site
7	Documentation of site selection process	Site Selection Report

The constraint mapping will help identify areas within the study area that are not suitable for siting the preferred Alternative To, such as Aboriginal lands, provincially significant natural environments, etc. Once the constraint map has been used to identify suitable areas, it will be refined to identify a long list of candidate properties. The long list candidate sites will be then be evaluated using a high level environmental, social and economic analysis to determine a short list of candidate sites.

Site investigations will then be conducted on the short-list of candidate sites, including natural environment and archaeological investigations. These investigations will provide the background information required to evaluate the short-listed sites, with the intent of avoiding significant areas and reducing the overall environmental impact.

The evaluation of "Alternatives To" could conclude that more than one type of facility is preferred. Should this occur, each facility would undergo a similar site selection process.

7. Assessment and Evaluation

7.1 Evaluating the "Alternatives To"

The evaluation of the how to manage the Municipality's residual waste after diversion (i.e. the "Alternatives To" the undertaking) will include a comparison of the advantages and disadvantages associated with each alternative, which will then be considered in an economic, social and environmental analysis. The step-by-step methodology for the "Alternatives To" evaluation is described below.

Before the evaluation takes place, the proposed evaluation methodology and the preliminary evaluation criteria (see Appendix A) will be reviewed with the public and government review agencies.



Table 7.1: Preliminary Methodology for Evaluation of the "Alternatives to"

Step	Activity
1	The "alternatives to" will be assembled into a range of alternative proposed waste management systems (e.g., landfill, waste-to-energy with landfill, etc), with each system being capable of managing all of the residual waste stream;
2	Data will be collected for use in the evaluation of the alternative proposed waste management systems (the proposed preliminary evaluation criteria are included in Appendix A of this EA TOR). Suggested indicators and data sources will be included in the background documents and may be adjusted during the EA evaluation process based on input received from agencies and the public. Potential data sources are listed in Tables A1 and B3.
3	The evaluation criteria will be applied to each of the proposed waste management systems and the potential effects identified.
4	For each effect identified under the criteria, potential measures to mitigate the effects will be considered, and the net effects for each criterion identified.
5	The net effects associated with each alternative waste management system will be compared and a list of relative advantages and disadvantages for each alternative will be developed.
6	The 'alternatives to' will be ranked based on the advantages and disadvantages of each and in context with the priorities established through the consultation process, and the preferred alternative will be selected.

7.2 Evaluating the "Alternative Methods"

The evaluation of "alternative methods" of carrying out the undertaking will consist of a facility selection process. Site selection will start with a review of the entire study area to identify those areas considered un-constrained from the stand-point of locating a processing and/or disposal facility. These available areas will then be systematically evaluated to identify a long-list of sites, which will then undergo additional screening and comparative evaluation, ultimately resulting in a preferred alternative. At the outset of this stage, the process and the preliminary selection/evaluation criteria will be reviewed with the public and by the Government Review Team and may be changed or further refined.

The step-by-step methodology for the "alternatives methods" evaluation is described in Table 7.2.



Table 7.2: Preliminary Methodology for Evaluation of the "Alternative Methods"

Step	Activity
1	Siting constraints (see Appendix B) will be applied to entire study area. Those lands considered unconstrained for the siting of a processing and/or disposal facility will be identified. Lands within the study area which are constrained by any of the exclusionary criteria would be screened out for the purpose of moving forward in the site selection process.
2	A minimum site size requirement for the type of facility to be sited will be identified based on the preferred alternative selected.
3	A "long-list" of alternative opportunities in the un-constrained lands will be identified through a review of publicly owned lands and the issuance of a request for "willing host" properties. The "long-list" of alternatives will be reviewed to ensure that a reasonable range of alternatives are included on the list.
	If it is determined that there is not a reasonable range of siting opportunities on the "long-list", then a review of privately-owned lands in the study area would be conducted to identify additional siting opportunities with the same or better attributes than those publicly owned and "willing host" sites on the list. The owners of identified properties would be approached to determine if a negotiated acquisition of the property is feasible. The updated "long-list" would then be reviewed to ensure that a reasonable range of alternatives are included on the list.
	If at this stage it is determined that there is still not a reasonable range of siting opportunities on the "long-list" then the constraints applied at Step 1 would be reviewed and relaxed in consultation with the public and government agencies. Steps 2 and 3 would be repeated as necessary to obtain a reasonable "long list"
4	A "long-list" site evaluation will be carried out if there are more than three sites remaining after the application of siting constraints and consideration of available siting opportunities The purpose of this level of evaluation is to remove those sites less likely to be suitable based on specific environmental, economic and social criteria. The proposed "long-list" evaluation criteria are included in Appendix B.
	The result of the "long list" evaluation will be a "short list" of alternative sites.
5	The "short list" of alternative sites will be evaluated using the triple-bottom line assessment described in Section 7.1 for the evaluation of "Alternatives to". This will result in the identification of a preferred site. The criteria for use in evaluating the "short-list" is included in Appendix B.

7.3 EA Studies and Evaluations

A wide range of studies and evaluations will be conducted to provide the information required for a thorough evaluation and assessment of the "Alternatives to" and the "Alternative methods". A list of those studies and evaluations include, but are not limited to:



- Geologic and hydrogeologic features and conditions, including baseline assessments and in accordance with O.Reg. 232/98;
- Surface water features and conditions, including baseline assessments;
- Potential water takings;
- Natural heritage assessments (which would include fish values, aquatic resources, wildlife habitats, among other items);
- Species at risk assessments;
- · Archaeological and heritage assessments;
- Socio-economic assessment;
- Existing and planned land uses (which would include the identification of parks and protected areas, crown land recreational values and users, among other items);
- Transportation facilities and corridors, including potential impacts on traffic;
- Natural resource use, including agriculture, forestry, and mineral extraction, as well as other commercial uses (e.g., trapping, tourism operations, baitfish operators, bear management areas, etc);
- Air and noise assessments:
- Identification of potential effects, mitigation measures and net effects of the "alternatives to" and the alternative methods":
- Constraint maps;
- · Potential contingencies; and
- Any additional maps or documents required under the EAA and those based on provisions of O. Reg. 334 under the EAA.

The studies and evaluations required for this EA will be updated throughout the EA process. The studies will be conducted in compliance with all applicable regulations and in consultation with the appropriate review agencies and in such a way as to provide information at a level of detail sufficient to enable the identification of potential effects that may be expected to occur as a result of the implementation of an "Alternative To" or an "Alternative Method".

With respect to the noise and vibration studies, the following MOE guidelines and documents will be used:

- Construction noise:
 - MOE Publication NPC-115, "Construction Equipment"; and
 - MOE Publication NPC-118, "Motorized Conveyances".
- Operations noise:
 - MOE Publication NPC-205, "Sound Level Limits for Stationary Sources in Class 1 & 2 Areas (Urban)"; and/or
 - MOE Publication NPC-232, "Sound Level Limits for Stationary Sources in Class 3 Areas (Rural)".



- Construction vibration:
 - MOE Publication NPC-207, "Impulse Vibration in Residential Buildings", November 1983, as amended.
- Noise Report (to be prepared in accordance with the following documents):
 - MOE Publication NPC-233, "Information to be Submitted for Approval of Stationary Sources of Sound", October 1995, as amended; and
 - "Supporting Information for the Preparation of an Acoustic Assessment Report," prepared by the Air and Noise Unit, Environment Assessment and Approvals Branch, November 2003.

With respect to studies concerning surface water impacts, the following tasks will be undertaken:

- A general description of the surface water features of the watersheds for the study area.
- A description of the surface water features occurring within 500 m of the alternative sites. The
 description will be based on contributing and receiving drainage, catchment, subwatershed or
 watershed areas that are sufficiently large to allow an assessment of the range and extent of
 potential effects. The description will also include a description of surface water features such
 as flood plains, natural watercourses and water bodies, municipal drains, drainage paths and
 boundaries.
- A detailed surface water investigation (including interpretation of results) to assess water
 quality, quantity and habitat conditions of the surface water features identified on the
 alternative sites, any surface water features flowing through the alternative sites, and any
 surface water features that could receive surface water discharge from the alternative sites.
- An assessment of the suitability of the alternative sites for waste management purposes (depending on the preferred "Alternative To"), considering the areas in which the alternative sites are located and their on-site and receiving surface water features.

The geologic and hydrogeological studies will be conducted in accordance with O.Reg. 232/98 and report on:

- Plans, specifications and descriptions of the geologic and hydrogeologic conditions of the site and the area in which the site is located; and
- An assessment of the suitability of the site for the landfilling of municipal waste, taking into
 - The design of the site, including existing features and features that will be implemented to control the expected production of leachate and the expected subsurface migration of landfill gas;
 - o Regional and site specific geologic and hydrogeologic conditions;
 - The ability to identify future impacts on the ground water by monitoring;
 - The feasibility of contingency plans that can be implemented to control leachate produced in a quantity greater than expected or with a quality worse than expected; and
 - The feasibility of contingency plans that can be implemented to control landfill gas migrating in the subsurface in a quantity greater than expected or with a quality worse than expected.



O.Reg 347/90 (General –Waste Management) and O.Reg. 232/98 (Landfilling Sites) will also be considered and referenced during the detailed study and evaluation process. O.Reg 347/90 governs existing landfill sites and landfill sites that are equal or less than 40,000 cubic metres in volume. It also regulates all aspects of waste (generation, transport, and disposal). O.Reg. 232/98 governs new or expanding landfilling sites and contains detailed requirements for the design, operation, closure and post-closure care of municipal (i.e. non-hazardous) waste landfilling sites. The document *Landfill Standards: A Guideline on the Regulatory and Approval Requirements for New or Expanding Landfilling Sites* (January 2012) by the Government of Ontario will be consulted during the planning and undertaking of the various project studies.

8. Existing Environment and Potential Effects

The environment that may be affected by a proposed waste management site for the Municipality is briefly described below. The EA will include a detailed description of the environment within the study area, as well as potential impacts to the environment and recommended approaches to mitigate them.

8.1 Natural Environment

The Municipality is located along Trans-Canada Highway 11 in Northwestern Ontario, 300 km northeast of the City of Thunder Bay. Greenstone is located in the District of Thunder Bay and has an area of 3,172 sq km, making it one of the largest municipalities in Canada.

The Municipality is located deep within the Canadian Shield and in the Superior Geological Province. The surficial deposits of the western and eastern portions of the municipality consists primarily of thin till with some subaqueous outwash and ice contact glaciofluvial sediments. The central areas of the municipality is predominantly thick till with organic deposits¹.

The Municipality is located within the Boreal Shield Ecozone². A review of the Municipality's Official Plan Schedules shows that, while the Municipality covers a large area, most of it is wilderness or forested areas.

The Municipality's is divided by two of Canada's ocean watersheds. The central portion of the Municipality (including Nakina) falls within the Hudson Bay Watershed, while the east and west portions are located within the Atlantic Ocean Watershed³. Both Geraldton and Longlac fall within the Hudson Bay Watershed, which is more commonly referred to as the Arctic Watershed. A constructed diversion of water over the height of land allows water from some of the lakes and streams surrounding Geraldton and Longlac to be manually routed to either the Arctic Watershed or the Atlantic Watershed (D. Barker. Personal Communications. July 19, 2013).

There are numerous wetlands across the Municipality, particularly in its central and eastern portions. The Wetland Region of the Municipality is characterized as Humid Mid-Boreal⁴, and

freshwater wetlands are distributed across approximately 5% - 10% of the Municipality⁵. Lake Nipigon is located on its western border.

The Official Plan Schedules identifies a number of wildlife habitats within the Municipality's boundaries, including:

- Moose wintering areas;
- Moose aquatic feeding areas;
- Woodland caribou areas;
- Nesting sites;
- High waterfowl use areas;
- Fish spawning areas; and
- Cold water streams.

There are also a number of protected or specially designated management areas within the Municipality, including:

- Lake Nipigon Provincial Park;
- Nipigon Palisades Conservation Reserve;
- MacLeod Provincial Park;
- Nakina Moraine Provincial Park; and
- Lake Nipigon/Beardmore Enhanced Management Area.

A portion of the Lake Nipigon Basin Signature Site is located within the Municipality and is protected by the Lake Nipigon Basin Signature Site Ecological Land Use and Resource Management Strategy.

8.2 Social/Cultural

The Municipality was formed in January 2001 by the amalgamation of the Towns of Geraldton and Longlac, the Townships of Nakina and Beardmore, and an extensive area of unincorporated territory that included a number of settlement areas. Neighbouring Aboriginal communities to the Municipality include Long Lake 58, Lake Nipigon Ojibway, Rocky Bay, Sand Point, Aroland and Ginoogaming First Nations.

In 2011, the Municipality had a population of 4,724. This was a change of -3.3% from the 2006 census⁶. The Municipality has an older population compared to the provincial average. The Municipality reports that the percentage of the total population of the ages of 45 to 64 is higher than the provincial average, while the percentages for those aged 20 to 44 is below the provincial average⁷.

8.3 Economic and Built Environment

The largest occupational group in the Municipality is the sales and service group (23% of labour force), followed by trades, transport and equipment operators and related occupations (20%).

The manufacturing industry accounts for the largest percentage (23.5%) of the labour force in the Municipality, followed by the health care and social assistance industry (10.4%).




Figure 8.1: Ministry of Transportation Ontario Road Map (Greenstone Area)

The main highway infrastructure serving the Municipality is Highway 11 (part of the Trans-Canada Highway), which runs east to west and links the Municipality with Highway17 (also part of the Trans-Canada Highway), Red Rock, and Thunder Bay to the west, and Hearst and Kapuskasing to the east. Highway 584 provides the main link for Nakina to the rest of the Municipality, via Gerladton. Figure 8.1 presents an MTO road map for the Greenstone area.

Two domestic airports are located in the Municipality: one in Nakina and the other in Geraldton. The nearest international airport is the Thunder Bay International Airport.

Both CN Rail and VIA Rail provided service to the Municipality. The CN Rail route runs through Caramat, Longlac, and Nakina. VIA Rail also provides pick-up and drop-off locations in these communities.

The Municipality's Official Plan (2010) establishes three categories of settlement areas, which include:



- Urban Settlement Areas (Beardmore, Geraldton, Longlac and Nakina)
- Rural Settlement Areas (Caramat, Jellicoe, Orient Bay, and Macdiarmid); and
- Rural Area.

The Official Plan characterizes Urban Settlement Areas as "urban communities with a well developed built-form, a diverse mix of land uses and which have full municipal sewage and water services or partial services."

Rural Settlement Areas are described as "small communities within a largely rural setting that have a mix of land uses including public service facilities, but which are predominantly residential communities."

The Official Plan considers Rural Areas as those not located within a designated urban or rural settlement area and is described as having "wide open spaces where the make-up of development consists of clusters of development, scattered residential uses much of which is water front oriented, forestry operations, transportation and infrastructure corridors, pits and quarries and a variety of other rural-type uses."

The Municipality has five public elementary schools, five Catholic elementary schools, and two secondary schools. There is a public library each in Beardmore, Longlac, Geraldton and Nakina.

Land uses in the areas proximate to the Municipality's landfill sites are described in Table 8.1.

8.4 Potential Effects

The potential effects of the preferred solution will depend on the preferred "alternative to". Typical effects commonly associated with the "alternatives to" that may require mitigation include:

- Emissions of greenhouse gasses and other air pollutants through the transport, biodegradation, combustion or processing of solid wastes;
- Disturbance of vegetation and potential terrestrial and/or aquatic habitat, if the chosen location for the preferred alternative includes these features;
- Potential for bird hazards to aircraft for landfills sited in proximity to an airport;
- Potential for noise impacts when operating the facility;
- Impact to local water quality if leachate and surface water runoff from the site is not managed properly;
- Disturbance to cultural, recreational, heritage and archaeological values;
- Effects on treaty and aboriginal rights.

A full assessment of the potential impacts and measures for their mitigation will be conducted during the EA process.

9. Commitments to Address Identified Issues and Monitor Effects

During the course of developing and approval of the TOR, a summary of any commitments made and how these commitments are to be met will be prepared and included in the EA. The final EA report will also include a comprehensive list of commitments that were made during the EA process. These may include:

- Measures to manage impacts:
- Additional works and studies to be carried out;
- · Monitoring programs/activities;
- Public consultation and contingency planning; and
- Documentation and correspondence.

Over the course of the study and the application of evaluation criteria, potential effects and mitigative requirements will be identified for the proposed undertaking. It is noted that these considerations will be defined based on supporting EA studies. During the EA process, a monitoring framework will be developed that considers all phases of the identified undertaking and will include monitoring to ensure compliance and/or effects on the environment.

Commitments made to date include:

- The following self-screening procedures will be conducted early in the site-selection process to identify known cultural heritage resources and provide guidance for evaluating specific alternative sites and reporting on this process within the Environmental Study report:
 - a. **Archaeological Resources**: Potential sites will be screened with the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport's (MTCS) *Criteria for Evaluating Archaeological Potential* (see Appendix F). This will determine whether the potential sites may impact



- archaeological resources: MTCS archaeological sites data are available at archaeologysites@ontario.ca. If the potential sites exhibit archaeological potential, then an archaeological assessment (AA) conducted by an archaeologist licensed under the Ontario Heritage Act would be recommended and the AA report forwarded to MTCS for review.
- b. Built Heritage and Cultural Heritage Landscapes: Potential sites will be screened against the MTCS Screening for Impacts to Built Heritage and Cultural Heritage Landscapes checklist (see Appendix G). This will determine whether a potential site may impact these cultural heritage resources: If the project may impact known or potential cultural heritage resources, MTCS recommends that a Heritage Impact Assessment be prepared by a qualified consultant and the completed HIAs sent to MTCS and the local municipality for review and made available to local heritage organizations with an interest, prior to issuance of the EA Notice of Completion.
- 2. MTCS will be advised whether archaeological and/or heritage impact assessments will be completed during the EA process. Any assessments completed will be forwarded to MTCS for review prior to issuing a Notice of Completion.
- 3. If any of the related project undertakings cross or affect a potentially navigable waterway, the proponent should prepare and submit an application in accordance with the requirements as outlined in Transport Canada's Navigable Waters Protection Act Request for Work Approval Application Guide and Form (see Appendix H). Transport Canada's Minor Works and Waters (Navigable Waters Protection Act) Order should be reviewed to determine if the proposed work is considered as a minor and does not require an application under the NWPA.

Consultation Plan for Environmental Assessment

10.1 Stakeholders

Stakeholders to be consulted during the EA process include:

- Government and Agencies that represent the interests and mandate of various governmental departments, ministries and agencies potentially affected by the outcome of the EA Study. A Government & Agency Review Team (GART) list has been established for the study and is included in Appendix C.
- The General Public. This includes residents, landowners and businesses within the study area that may either have a broad or general interest in the study or may be directly affected by the study outcome. Over the course of the EA TOR development, a contact list of those individuals and groups expressing interest in the study will be compiled. This list will be updated as the study proceeds. The general public will be contacted through the media, the Municipality's website, and public notices.
- Aboriginal Peoples potentially impacted or interested in the undertaking will be identified
 through contact with the Ontario Ministry of Environment, Aboriginal Affairs, Aboriginal
 Affairs and Northern Development Canada, and local bands, tribal councils and Métis
 communities. All public documents will be circulated to the interested aboriginal groups,
 including the TOR for their review and comment. All comments will be recorded and
 addressed in the Consultation Record supporting the EA.



A mailing list is provided in Appendix D.

10.2 Consultation Activities

The minimum scope of consultation activities for EA study milestones are provided in the table below. The full program for public consultation and engagement will be developed during the initial phase of the EA.

The Record of Consultation pertaining to the preparation of the draft TOR is enclosed as Appendix E.

Input will be obtained from stakeholders through a variety of means, including:

- Correspondence through electronic and regular mail: contact information such as an e-mail address and a mailing address will be provided on project communication materials, including the project website, to allow stakeholders the opportunity to provide written comment at any point during the EA process.
- In-person conversation: stakeholders will be able to speak with the project team to provide
 their comments, seek clarification or to discuss issues throughout the process. This will be
 done at the open houses, through face-to-face or conference call meetings, or by calling the
 EA's project manager.
- Open houses: forms will be provided at the open houses to obtain targeted feedback on key
 EA components or findings. This feedback will be used to update and/or confirm decisions
 made up to that point in time or to be considered in upcoming decisions. Those attending the
 open house will also be to provide any other comments they have, either in writing or through
 conversations with members of the project team participating in the open house.

10.3 Issues Resolution

Over the course of the study, it is expected that issues will arise that require resolution either before moving from one step to the next or prior to the issuance of approvals. It will be the Municipality's preference to resolve issues as they arise and without the assistance of an outside party. However, should this approach not work the use of a facilitator to negotiate a resolution or use of the EAA's mediation provisions will be considered. It is recognized that unresolved issues could be referred to the Province's Environmental Review Tribunal, which would make a decision on approval of the undertaking, and that unresolved issues could have a bearing on that decision and that conditions of approval could be imposed to deal with certain issues.

11. Modifying the Terms of Reference

This TOR provides the framework for conducting the EA process and preparing the EA report. However, as identified through the requirements of a TOR in the EAA and in the MOE's Code of Practice on preparing TORs, they are generally not intended to present every detail that will occur throughout the EA process. Therefore, it is possible that in carrying out the work contemplated by this TOR it may become evident that certain modifications to this TOR are necessary. It is important to note that the commitments described in this TOR are a minimum that must be met, and that more may be required if necessary. It is envisioned that such changes may include but are not limited to:

- Requirements for additional or expanded evaluations, studies or work to ensure that the nature and magnitude of potential positive and negative environmental effects are fully and accurately identified.
- Changes in methodology of the studies referred to in Section 7. This may be in response
 to studies that showed environmental effects to be greater or less than previously
 estimated.
- Modifications to the consultation program.
- Any other modifications required or available through changes to Acts or Regulations.



It should be noted that this list is not intended to be exhaustive but instead sets out by example the types of changes or modifications that may be considered within the framework as set out by this TOR.

In the event of uncertainty as to whether a proposed change should be considered routine or of note, the MOE will be consulted through the MOE EA project officer.

12. Other Required Approvals

Approval required under the EAA the Environmental Protection Act (EPA) for each alternative will be identified as appropriate. Also, any further approvals for the preferred undertaking will be identified in the EA. For example, these could include, but are not limited to:

- Federal/Provincial EA coordination;
- Fisheries Act (Department of Fisheries and Oceans);
- Lakes and Rivers Improvement Act (Ministry of Natural Resources);
- Stormwater and leachate management approvals (Ministry of the Environment);
- Permit to Take Water (Ministry of the Environment);
- Environmental Compliance Approval for Waste (Ministry of the Environment);
- Environmental Compliance Approval for Air (Ministry of the Environment);
- Environmental Compliance Approval for Noise (Ministry of the Environment);
- Navigable Waters Protection Act (Transport Canada);
- Some form of tenure of patent if chosen site is on Crown land;
- Local approvals, such as noise bylaws, road closures, tree removals, site alterations, etc. (local municipality).

While this undertaking is subject to the requirements of the Ontario EA Act, the requirements of the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act (CEAA) may also apply. As a result, the proponent will work in a coordinated way with the provincial and federal governments to satisfy both levels of environmental legislation pursuant to the Canadian-Ontario Agreement on EA Cooperation.

The results of this study will also satisfy Regulation 347/90 (General –Waste Management) and Regulation 232/98 (Landfilling Sites) under the EPA.

In order to ensure an effective and efficient coordination of the provincial and federal EA processes, a project description will be prepared in a timely fashion for circulation to federal authorities to determine if there is trigger under the CEAA.

The intent is to produce a single EA body of documentation on environmental effects to meet all of the information needs of both the federal and provincial governments. To the extent practical, both federal and provincial information requirements regarding potential issues will integrated into this EA.



13. Environmental Assessment Report and Submission

An EA Report will document the EA, which will be carried out in accordance with the approved TOR and in adherence to the requirements set out in subsection 6.1(2) of the EAA and Section 2 of O.Reg 334.

Heritage Impact Assessment and Archaeological Assessment reports and their recommendations are part of the EA project. The EA Report will document and summarize any determinations that no cultural heritage resources are impacted and no technical studies are warranted as part of the EA Process.

A draft of the EA Report will be made available for agency/public review prior to formal submission to the Ministry of the Environment (MOE). The purpose of the pre-submission review is to obtain comments on the contents of the EA report before submitting it formally to the Minister for review and approval.

Once comments from the pre-submission review are incorporated, the EA report will be formally submitted to the Minister for review and approval. The EA report will also undertake a formal public and agency review process.

- Park/recreational lands**
- 15 km around federally regulated airports.
- Aboriginal reserves.
- Where possible, areas with less than 1 metre (subject to further consideration) of overburden in the base of the potential landfill.
- Where possible, areas less than 50 metres from a permanent watercourse.
- Land that would prevent the efficient expansion of settlement areas, on sites adjacent or close to settlement areas.
- Land containing significant habitat of endangered species and/or threatened species*.
- Land known/identified as a mineral, mineral aggregate or petroleum resource, where
 development would preclude or hinder their expansion or continued use or which would be
 incompatible for reasons of public health, safety or environmental impact.
- Lands where there are natural and or/humane made hazards that cannot be mitigated (e.g., flooding, mine hazards, etc).
- Lands containing sufficiently significant cultural heritage resources, whether archaeological, built heritage or cultural heritage landscape.
- Lands with land use direction not consistent with the project.

1.0 Record of Consultation

1.1 Introduction

At the outset of the project, a consultation plan and list of contacts was developed and reviewed with input from the Municipality and Ministry of Environment (MOE), including the Aboriginal Affairs Branch of the local MOE office. The Consultation Plan is enclosed as Appendix A.

Aboriginal Communities were identified for consultation based on those that are located within the Robinson-Superior Treaty Area, which encompasses the Municipality's boundaries. Additionally, two Métis groups in the Greenstone area were identified for consultation.

Consultation with the various Government Agencies, Aboriginal Communities, special interest groups and the general public during the preparation of the Terms of Reference (ToR) was conducted in accordance with the project Consultation Plan. The following sections detail the consultation completed at each stage of the project.

1.1 Notice of Commencement

The Notice of Commencement was distributed in accordance with the Consultation Plan on the dates noted:

- Six (6) Aboriginal communities were sent a letter inviting them to participate in direct consultation November 28, 2012;
- Posted to Municipality's Website December 12, 2012;
- Letter notices were mailed to the Aboriginal and Métis communities not identified for direct consultation December 18, 2012;
- Advertised in the local newspaper (Times Star) on December 19 and 26, 2012;
- Letter notices were mailed to the Government Review Agencies and identified special interest groups December 17, 2012.

The Notice of Commencement, sample letters and distribution list are enclosed as Appendix B.

1.1.1 Aboriginal Consultation

Following the Notice of Commencement, follow-ups were made by the Municipality with the six (6) the Aboriginal Communities identified for direct consultation, as follows:

- 1. Attempts to contact the Long Lake #58 First Nation via telephone were made on December 4,6,10 and 13 2012. Messages were left, but no response was received.
- Attempts to contact the Aroland First Nation were made via telephone on December 4, and Chief Sonny Gagnon's cell number was provided. Attempt to contact the Chief by cell phone were made December 4,6 and 10, 2013. The voicemail box was full and a message could not be left.

3. Attempts to contact the BZA First Nation via telephone were made on December 4, 6 and 10, 2012. An emailed response from the First Nation was eventually received on February 13, 2013, see Table 1.

1.2 Notice of Public Consultation Centre

The Notice of Public Consultation was distributed in accordance with the Consultation Plan on the dates noted:

- Posted to Municipality's Website January 25, 2013;
- Letter notices were mailed to Government Review Agencies and identified special interest groups January 28, 2013.
- Six (6) Aboriginal communities were sent a letter inviting them to participate in direct consultation—January 30, 2013;
- Letter notices were mailed to the Aboriginal and Métis communities not identified for direct consultation January 30, 2013;
- Advertised in the local newspaper (Times Star) on January 30 and February 6, 2013;

The Notice of Public Consultation Centre, sample letters and distribution list are enclosed as Appendix C.

The Public Consultation Centre (PCC) was held on February 11, 2013 from 4-7:30 pm at the Municipal Office in the Geraldton Ward. A total of 19 persons attended the Public Consultation Centre. A copy of the slides presented at the PCC is enclosed as Appendix D.

Comments received to March 15, 2013, the end of the comment period, are enclosed as Appendix E1.

1.3 Draft Terms of Reference Review

Following the PCC, the Terms of Reference (ToR) was drafted based on the comments received to date. The draft ToR, dated June 3, 2013, was submitted to the Government and Agency Review Team (GART) for review and comment on June 17, 2013, comments were requested to be forwarded by July 22, 2013.

Printed copies of the draft ToR were also sent to the six Aboriginal Communities identified for "direct consultation". Additionally, printed copies of the draft ToR were provided to the Red Sky Independent Metis Nation and the Greenstone Metis Council. The documents were delivered by the Municipality on August 9, 2013.

Those Aboriginal Communities identified for "limited consultation" were emailed a copy of the draft ToR for review and comment.

The comments received from the review of the draft ToR are enclosed as Appendix E2.



Purpose of the Proposed Undertaking

The purpose of the proposed undertaking is to create a long term (20 to 30 year) plan for the disposal of the Municipality's solid waste. The plan will be created through the Environmental Assessment (EA) process, which will be used to review and screen alternative disposal options for the Municipality.

-- Alternatives To Be Evaluated

Alternative	Description	
Thermal Processing	Thermal processing involves the conversion of solid waste to energy, most often through a combustion process. This energy can be captured and used to generate electricity or heat, depending on the process used. While some residual waste would require disposal, this alternative would minimize that amount.	
Biological Processing	Biological treatment involves the use of micro-organisms such as aerobic and anaerobic bacteria to break down and stabilize the organic portion of the waste stream. There is the potential to capture biogas in this process, which can be used to generate energy. The residual waste will require landfill disposal.	
Landfill Expansion	Expand one or more of Greenstone's existing landfills to enable it to receive more waste in the future, specifically, all of the Municipality's residual waste.	
Waste Diversion	Waste can be diverted from disposal through waste diversion programs. Waste not diverted will require disposal.	
New Landfill	Site a new landfill. Landfilling is one of the most common and readily available used forms of disposing of residual waste.	
Export of Waste	If no method of managing Greenstone's residual waste stream is available within Greenstone's borders, then waste could be sent to another private or municipal facility for disposal.	
Do nothing	Maintain the status quo and continue with current disposal activities.

Transport Canada is concerned with the risks posed by impacts between aircraft and birds. For this reason, waste facility proposals are reviewed to determine their potential to influence the probability, frequency, and severity of this problem. It is our position that all waste facility projects should include the implementation of a bird management plan which addresses aviation safety criteria, and that these facilities should commit to operating as bird-free sites. We recommend that the project considers the following general guidance:

- Seek to avoid developments that would attract birds into proximity with airports. Specifically, Transport
 Canada recommends against the siting or expansion of landfills within 15 km of an airport, where risks are
 highest. One of the compliance criteria included in Transport Canada's new Airport Wildlife Planning and
 Management regulation is based on waste disposal facilities situated within 15 km of the airport
 geometric center. These airports will be required to conduct a risk assessment and have in place a wildlife
 management plan.
- Since birds are known to travel up to 60 km between roosting and feeding sites, strict bird hazard management plans may need to be developed for waste facilities within this zone.
- Risks are greatest where an airport lies between a water body and a landfill, as this may cause bird flight
 paths to cross aeronautical flight paths.
- Once a preferred alternative is known, Transport Canada suggests that the proponent follows the advice
 of a consultant with experience in conducting bird hazard assessments for projects of a similar nature.

Please review the <u>Minor Works and Waters (Navigable Waters Protection Act) Order</u>, established to outline the specific standards and criteria under which Transport Canada considers a work as a minor and does not require an application under the NWPA. It is the responsibility of the applicant, prior to submitting an application to the Navigable Waters Protection Program for review, to assess whether their work meets the criteria, as described, and, therefore, falls within one of the excluded classes. An application will only be required if it is determined that the work cannot meet the criteria established for that particular "class" of excluded work.

Transport Canada is also responsible for inspecting and auditing federally regulated railway companies that are subject to the *Railway Safety Act*. Transport Canada also regulates some provincial shortlines from the Province of Ontario that are part of an Agreement between the Federal Government and the Province of Ontario. The *Railway Safety Act*, with related regulations and rules, provides the legislative and regulatory framework for safe railway operations in Canada. The rail safety program develops, implements and promotes safety policy, regulations, standards and research, and in the case of railway grade crossings, subsidizes safety improvements. A list of all the Rail Safety legislations (the *Act*, Regulations, Rules, Guidelines, Policies and Standards) that applies to the federally regulated railways, can be found here:

The *Act* also addresses the construction and alteration of railway works, the operation and maintenance of railway equipment and certain non-railway operations that may affect the safety of federally regulated railways. If a proposed railway work is of a prescribed kind, pursuant to the *Notice of Railway Works Regulations*, the proponent shall not undertake the work unless it has first given notice of the work in accordance with the regulation. Thank you for having us on your Public Consultation Mailing List as we require you to keep us informed throughout the process and particularly when the "unconstrained" sites have been determined. The potential sites within the Municipality of Greenstone may either be on Crown land or patented land. Either way, MNR's interests include impacts to fish and wildlife on and adjacent to the site as well as impacts to adjacent land uses such as public recreation, tourism and forest industries, etc. We have an internal database of these types of values which will assist with our review of the potential sites.



Thank you for providing the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport (MTCS) with the draft Terms of Reference for the above project: for such an undertaking, it is the mandate of MTCS, under the *Ontario Heritage Act* (*OHA*), to conserve, protect and preserve Ontario's cultural heritage, including:

- · Archaeological resources:
- Built heritage resources (including bridges and monuments); and,
- Cultural heritage landscapes.

Under the EA process, a determination of the project's potential impact on these cultural heritage resources must be carried out, as below. Please advise MTCS whether archaeological and/or heritage impact assessments will be completed for your EA project, and forward them to MTCS, prior to issuing a Notice of Completion.

MTCS Comments on the Draft Terms of Reference

In general, please note that the <u>Standards and Guidelines for Conservation of Provincial Heritage</u>
<u>Properties</u> (S&G), prepared pursuant to Section 25.2 of the Ontario Heritage Act, came into effect on July 1, 2010. All Ontario government ministries and public bodies that are prescribed under Ontario Regulation 157/10 must comply with the S&Gs. They apply to property that is owned or controlled by the Crown in right of Ontario or by a prescribed public body.

For Appendix A, in Table A1, the Social/Cultural evaluation category can include sensitive cultural heritage resources, which though rare can prove to be sufficiently significant to preclude alteration, and should be acknowledged here.

Likewise, Table B1 of Appendix B can also include mention that sufficiently significant cultural heritage resources may likewise exclude lands from consideration as an alternative, whether archaeological, built heritage or cultural heritage landscape.

In the Government and Agency Review Team list provided by Table C1 of Appendix C (page 20), the Ministry of Tourism (MoT) and Ministry of Culture (MoC) are now the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport (MTCS). In addition, with amendments to the *Ontario Heritage Act*, Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committees (LACACs) are now called Municipal Heritage Committees (MHCs).



Similarly, in Appendix D (page 25), please change the Ministry of Culture to the Ministry of Tourism Culture and Sport, and add me to the list of contacts.

Finally, while early in the process, the following self-screening procedures will identify known cultural heritage resources, and provide guidance for evaluating specific alternative sites and reporting on this process within the Environmental Study report:

Archaeological Resources

Screening your EA project with the attached MTCS Criteria for Evaluating Archaeological Potential will determine whether it may impact archaeological resources: MTCS archaeological sites data are available at archaeologysites@ontario.ca. If your EA project area exhibits archaeological potential, then an archaeological assessment (AA) by an OHA licensed archaeologist is recommended and the AA report forwarded to MTCS for review.

Built Heritage and Cultural Heritage Landscapes

The MTCS Screening for Impacts to Built Heritage and Cultural Heritage Landscapes checklist attached determines whether your EA project may impact these cultural heritage resources: the clerk for the Municipality of Greenstone can provide information on property listed or designated under the Ontario Heritage Act. If your EA project may impact known or potential cultural heritage resources, MTCS recommends that a Heritage Impact Assessment (HIA – see MTCS Info Sheet #5: Heritage Impact Assessments and Conservation Plans) be prepared by a qualified consultant. Please send completed HIAs to MTCS and the local municipality for review, and make it available to local heritage organizations with an interest, prior to issuance of your EA Notice of Completion.

Environmental Assessment Reporting

HIA and AA reports and their recommendations are part of the EA project. Determinations that no cultural heritage resources are impacted and no technical studies are warranted should be documented and summarized as part of the EA process, and incorporated into the final Environmental Study report.

In summary, please continue to circulate MTCS throughout the EA process for this project. Thank you for the opportunity to provide comment, and please contact me for any questions or clarification.

^{*} For the purposes of evaluating potential impacts of development and site alteration "adjacent" means: contiguous properties as well as properties that are separated from a heritage property by narrow strip of land used as a public or private road, highway, street, lane, trail, right-of way, walkway, green space, park, and/or easement or as otherwise defined in the municipal official plan.

1 INTRODUCTION

As requested, I have reviewed the groundwater related parts of the report prepared by the Municipality of Greenstone (the Municipality), entitled "Municipal Solid Waste Disposal Plan—Environmental Assessment Terms of Reference" and dated June 3, 2013. This report outlines the Terms of Reference (TOR) awaiting approval from the Ontario Ministry of the Environment (MOE) that will establish the framework for conducting an Environmental Assessment (EA) as required under the Ontario EA Act (EAA). The purpose of this review is to evaluate the completeness of the TOR and compliance with the EAA.

A brief list, outlined below, acknowledging the requirements of the procedures necessary to assess potential groundwater quality and quantity impacts would show the MOE that the Municipality is prepared to conduct the EA from a hydrogeological perspective. I recommend that such a list be provided in the final draft of the TOR. Otherwise, I am in agreement with the TOR provided by the Municipality. With the addition of the described information, it is my opinion that groundwater issues will be adequately assessed by the Municipality during the EA process.

2 TOR SUMMARY

2.1 Background

Currently the Geraldton Landfill is out of compliance with the existing CofA since waste is being disposed of outside of the approved footprint and the approved disposal volume has been exceeded. The Municipality is currently looking to amend the CofA to expand the footprint and capacity but this amendment would provide disposal services only through 2014. An EA is being undertaken by the Municipality to evaluate disposal alternatives and locations for the preferred alternative. This TOR provides the details of the activities and information that will be conducted and provided during the EA upon MOE approval.

The Municipality is looking to develop a long term (20-30 year) solid waste disposal plan to immediately service the town of Greenstone and provide service to other towns within the

Municipality in the future. A long term plan is required since the existing Geraldton Landfill is at capacity and other facilities within the Municipality do not have the capacity to offer a long term solid waste disposal solution.

The estimated population of the Municipality and, therefore, the estimated annual waste generated, is expected to decline in the future. In 2011 and 2012, it was estimated that 4,870 and 4,838 tonnes of waste was generated in the Municipality, respectively. Based on Canada Census information, the estimated waste generation is expected to continue to decrease steadily to approximately 3,884 tonnes generated in 2045. The total waste to be generated within the Municipality between 2014 and 2045 was estimated at 138,065 tonnes.

2.2 Alternatives to the Undertaking

To meet the solid waste disposal needs of the Municipality, several alternatives to the undertaking are proposed for further investigation during the EA. These alternative methods are: thermal processing, involving the combustion of some solid waste with the potential by-product of generated electricity or heat; biological processing, which uses microorganisms to break down organic wastes, with the potential to capture biogas for energy generation; expansion of the existing landfill, either horizontally or vertically; waste diversion and waste reuse, which involves the disposal of waste not reused or diverted; development of a new landfill; exportation of waste to a private or public waste facility external to the Municipality; and do nothing, which involves maintaining the status quo and provides a benchmark against which the other alternatives may be measured.

2.3 Alternative Methods for the Undertaking

Once the preferred alternative, or combination of alternatives, to the undertaking has been identified, the potential sites for that option will be explored, with the site evaluation method changing based on the alternative to the undertaking that is selected. The site selection process will involve: development of a constraint map, showing a map of potentially suitable areas based on existing land use; refinement of the constraint map, reducing the potential areas to a "long list" of candidate sites; high level environmental, social, and economic evaluation of long list sites, using comparisons to reduce to a "short list" of potential sites; and site assessments and evaluations, including environmental and archaeological investigations, of short list sites, using comparisons to determine the preferred site.

2.4 Evaluation Criteria

The Municipality identified the environments that could potentially be effected by the proposed alternatives, including the natural environment. Within the natural environment, the Municipality acknowledged the potential effects on surface and groundwater quality by listing the indicators of these effects as: type and severity of common surface and ground water impacts associated with alternatives; and potential for contamination or disruption to surface and ground water sources. Suggested preliminary evaluation criteria indicators to be used when assessing and comparing the short listed candidate sites include: number of water courses on or adjacent to the site; potential for contamination or disruption to surface and ground water sources; and effects on surface and ground water quality, quantities or flow, including significant sedimentation or soil erosion on or off site.

The Municipality notes that potential impacts that may require mitigation include impacts to local water quality if leachate and surface water runoff from the site is not managed properly. The proposed TOR states that the application of evaluation criteria, potential effects, and mitigative requirements will be identified for the proposed undertaking. Throughout the EA process monitoring may be required and the Municipality proposes that a monitoring framework will be developed to consider all phases of the undertaking and will include monitoring to ensure compliance and/or effects on the environment. The proposed TOR notes that stormwater and

leachate management approvals and/or one or more Permit to Take Water may be required from the MOE during the proposed undertaking.

3 REVIEWER'S CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The TOR document provides a vague but broad description of the potential impacts to groundwater quality and quantity associated with the proposed undertaking. However, if during the EA process the Municipality characterizes the indicators noted above by sufficiently assessing the type and severity of common groundwater impacts associated with alternatives and the potential for contamination or disruption to groundwater sources, it will be possible for the Municipality to adequately evaluate the negative impacts to groundwater quality and quantity. While the specific methods that will be used to collect and analyze the information regarding the listed preliminary evaluation criteria indicators was not provided, if this procedure is carried out by a qualified person to a degree that allows adequate comparisons between the alternatives then it is my opinion that the EA will be sufficient in assessing the impacts to groundwater quality and quantity.

I recommend that specifics regarding the acquisition of the information necessary for the comparison of the groundwater quality and quantity effects will be acquired be briefly summarized for each of the alternatives to the undertaking and provided in the final draft of the TOR. These specifics would include but no be limited to a list of: the monitoring techniques that will be used; the necessary site specific information required, including site history, hydrogeological and geological information, and general physiography; information collection/calculation methods; potential mitigation options; potential contingencies to be considered; and potential water takings that may be required.

A brief list, as outlined above, acknowledging the requirements of the procedures necessary to assess potential groundwater quality and quantity impacts would show the MOE that the Municipality is prepared to conduct the EA from a hydrogeological perspective. Otherwise, I am in agreement with the TOR provided by the Municipality. With the addition of the described information, it is my opinion that groundwater issues will be adequately assessed by the Municipality during the EA process.

For this undertaking, it is the mandate of MTCS, under the *Ontario Heritage Act* (*OHA*), to conserve, protect and preserve Ontario's cultural heritage, including:

- Archaeological resources;
- Built heritage resources, including bridges and monuments; and,
- Cultural heritage landscapes.

Under the EA process, a determination of the project's potential impact on these cultural heritage resources must be carried out. Please advise MTCS whether archaeological and/or heritage impact assessments will be completed for your EA project, and forward them to MTCS, prior to issuing a Notice of Completion.

MTCS Comments on the Draft Terms of Reference

In section 7.3, 'significant' is not needed to describe the archaeological and cultural heritage assessments. The assessments themselves will determine the significance, or degree of cultural heritage value or interest, of any cultural heritage resources identified.

Archaeological Resources

The amended draft Terms of Reference appropriately stipulates that your EA project will screen for archaeological resources using the MTCS *Criteria for Evaluating Archaeological Potential* and recommends archaeological assessment (AA) by an *OHA* licensed archaeologist where warranted.

 - i. MOE Publication NPC-207, "Impulse Vibration in Residential Buildings", November 1983, as amended.
- d. Noise Report shall be prepared in accordance with the following documents:
 - i. MOE Publication NPC-233, "Information to be Submitted for Approval of Stationary Sources of Sound", October 1995, as amended; and
 - ii. Supporting Information for the Preparation of an Acoustic Assessment Report, Prepared by the Air and Noise Unit, Environmental Assessment and Approvals Branch, November 2003.
- 2. Approval Name: The ToR identifies the required approval as a "Certificate of Approval". The term for the approval was recently revised to "Environmental Compliance Approval".

Ms. Bemben:

Londa Mortson, MNR Northwest Region, and I have reviewed the Terms of Reference that were provided to us last month.

In general we are pleased with the approach that you have taken - in that you appear to have left the assessment process open to examine a full range of siting options.

We have a number of thoughts and comments however - as follows:

Page 5, Table 4.1

The numbers in this document conflict with the numbers presented in Greenstone's Grow Plan. The Grow Plan is based upon a significant population growth over the same time period.

Alternatives should consider Greenstone's own plans for future development and growth. The ToR should acknowledge these other projections by Greenstone and incorporate those projections into the EA. How would the growth outlined in the Grow Plan affect the choice of a waste site?

Page 9, Section 7.2

Note that Preliminary selection and evaluation criteria will be reviewed by the Government Review Team at the outset of this stage. MNR expects that it will be provided an opportunity to provide input, at that time, to the refined set of criteria and indicators.

Page 10 & 11, Section 7.3 (list)

Consider the following as additions:

- fish values
- aquatic resources
- wildlife habitat
- Parks and Protected Areas
- commercial users (eg trappers, tourist operations, baitfish operators, bear management areas)
- Crown land recreational values & users
- Species at Risk

Page 12, Section 8.1, Paragraph 4

For completeness and accuracy you might wish to note that both Geraldton and Longlac also fall within the Hudson Bay Watershed (more commonly referred to at the Arctic Watershed). You may wish to note that a constructed diversion of water over the height of land now allows water from some of the lakes and streams surrounding Geraldton and Longlac to be manually routed to either the Arctic Watershed or the Atlantic Watershed Suggestion that you improve your description and include a map.

Page 13, Section 8.1, Top of Page

Add a reference to the Lake Nipigon Signature Site Management Strategy

Page 13, Section 8.2, Paragraph 1

For accuracy - none of the First Nations are within Municipal boundaries. All are governed independently of the municipality.

Page 13, Section 8.3, Paragraph 3

Suggest that you include mention of the other Highways that are within the Municipality or which join wards of the municipality. Transportation of waste on those highways is a potential issue.

Page 13, Section 8.3, Paragraph 5

Note that VIA Rail also drops off and picks up people in Caramat.

Page 14, Section 8.4

Consider the following as additions:

- disturbance to a wide range of values
 - o cultural
 - o recreational
 - o heritage
 - o archaeological
- effect on treaty and aboriginal rights

Page 15, Section 10.1, Aboriginal Peoples paragraph Consider adding reference to local Metis communities

Appendix A, Table A1

Consider the following as additions:

- · effect on treaty and aboriginal rights
- effect on recreational use of lands and waters
- effect on commercial users (trappers, tourist operators, retail or service operators, baitfish operations)

Appendix B, Table B1:

- Define "Designated Natural Heritage areas"
- Define "Designated tourism areas"
- Define "Significant habitat of endangered and threatened species"
- Define "park/recreational lands"
- · Add "Lands with land use direction not consistent with the project"

Appendix B, Table B3:

This is a very preliminary list of criteria and indicators. Include effect on resource harvest (e.g. forestry, trapping, hunting, baitfish, etc.)

Appendix D

Recommend an update to the list of Chiefs names for the First Nations Communities. There are errors on the list in this document.

Thank you for the opportunity to review the Draft Terms of Reference for the Municipality of Greenstone – Municipal Solid Waste Disposal Plan dated June 3, 2013. As stated, the Terms of Reference (TOR) is a high level document that will be used to evaluate the alternatives for the disposal of the Municipality's waste followed by the evaluation of potential sites for the preferred waste management alternative. I reviewed the TOR for issues that are would require a Ministry of Environment's Waste Approval as well as issues related to Regulation 347/90 (General –Waste Management) and Regulation 232/98 (Landfilling Sites).

The high level approach outlined in the TOR seems reasonable; however nether Regulations 347/90 nor 232/98 were mentioned in the TOR. Both these regulations are important as Regulation 232/98 governs new or expanding landfilling sites; while Regulations 347/90 governs existing landfill sites and landfill sites that are equal or less than 40,000 cubic metres in volume. In addition, Regulations 347/90 also regulates all aspects of waste (generation, transport, and disposal). Please keep both these regulations on hand and refer to them during the evaluations for disposal and potential sites.

Depending on the outcome of the evaluations, there may be a need to apply for a Environmental Compliance Approval for Waste from the Ministry of the Environment. This approval should be noted in Section 12. 'Other Required Approvals' of the TOR.

I hope my comments will assist in your evaluation and help find a solution to your waste needs.

As requested I have had a Regional Environmental Assessment Coordinator review reviewed the document entitled: Municipality of Greenstone — Municipal Solid Waste Disposal Plan Environmental Assessment Terms of Reference (draft) dated June 3, 2013 specifically for local and planning (e.g. land use compatibility) related concerns. Following are the resulting recommendations which should assist in improving this document and the associated environmental assessment process in light of MOE's mandate as it relates to these areas.

 Appendix B: Preliminary Evaluation Criteria for "Alternatives Methods" (i.e., Sites), Table B1: Preliminary Criteria for Excluding Lands from Consideration for Waste Disposal Site.

For waste disposal sites, MOE considers the most significant contaminant discharges and visual problems to be normally within 500m of the perimeter of the fill area. The actual influence area will however, vary with the individual waste disposal site and depending on site specifics and the operation itself have historically ranged from 3 km to less than 500m. Although the preliminary criteria for excluding lands from consideration for the new waste disposal site of 400m is not unreasonable, Greenstone may wish to consider increasing this distance to 500m if possible in order to avoid the occurrence of adverse effects on sensitive receivers such as residential or institutional areas. For more information on this consideration please see *Guideline D-4: Land Use On or Near Landfills and Dumps* which is available at MOE's Forms, Manuals and Guidelines

Hi, Kathy. My comments will include reference to the inadequacy of the text, as written, in section 11 to exhibit sufficient flexibility. Below is the text from another ToR (not yet approved, so please do not take this text to be gospel – it is to act simply as guidance) regarding this.

It is understood that, given the nature of ToR, it is not intended to present every detail of all the activities that will occur when preparing the EA. It is therefore possible that in carrying out the work contemplated by this ToR it may become evident that certain modifications to this ToR may be necessary. It is important to note that the commitments described in this ToR are a minimum that must be met, and that more may be required if necessary. It is envisioned that such changes may include:

- Requirements for additional or expanded evaluations, studies or work, (e.g., in the areas referred to in Section 9.0), to ensure that the nature and magnitude of potential positive and negative environmental effects are fully and accurately identified.
- Changes in methodology of the studies referred to in Section 9.0. This may be in response to studies that showed environmental effects to be greater or less than previously estimated.
- Modifications to the consultation program.
- Any other modifications required or available through changes to Acts or Regulations.

This list is not intended to be exhaustive. Rather, it sets out by example, the types of changes that will be considered routine and/or likely to result in insignificant effects on the environment, and therefore can be accommodated within the framework of the approved ToR.

In the event of uncertainty as to whether a proposed change should be considered routine or of note, the MOE will be consulted through the MOE EA project officer.

The EASS offer the following comments for your consideration when finalizing the ToR for formal submission. Section 1 – Introduction [and General Comments]

1. Abbreviations/short forms should be used at the initial reference (e.g., Ministry of the Environment – page 1, paragraph 5), and all abbreviations should be defined (e.g., C of A – page 1, paragraph 5).

Section 2 – Environmental Assessment Planning Process

2. Greater clarity is required regarding what EA approach the proponent will take on the EA. Per page 12 of the Code of Practice, a proponent should use subsections 6(2)(a) and 6.1(2) if it is early in the planning process and unsure of the details of its proposal (alternatives, potential effects, etc.) or subsections 6(2)(c) and 6.1(3) if there is a more defined planning process and more details of the proposal are already known. The latter

- is commonly referred to as "focusing." The EAA excerpt in Section 2 of the draft ToR cites all of the above subsections; it is therefore unclear to the reader which EA approach (focused or unfocused) the proponent is going to follow for this project. Please clarify this.
- 3. The readability of Figure 2.1 is compromised because of the low resolution of the figure. Please correct this.

Section 6 - Alternatives to be Evaluated

- 4. (cf. item 10 of the May 30, 2013 EASS comments) Section 6.2: the text still indicates plurality (e.g., "have been selected" and "for the preferred options"). Please correct this.
- 5. Please change the text to read "If a landfill expansion is the preferred Alternative To, then . . ." for clarity, since two different categories of alternatives will be considered (Alternatives To and Alternative Methods).

Section 7 – Assessment and Evaluation

- 6. Table 7.1 states that "data sources will be included in the background documents." It is unclear to the reader what background documents are being referred to. Additionally, subsection 4.2.7 of the Code of Practice requires the inclusion of potential data sources in the ToR. Please include potential data sources per the examples cited in the Code of Practice, these could be included in the table of criteria and indicators in Appendix A.
- 7. Section 7.3: Please consider stating that the studies will be conducted in compliance with all applicable regulations and in consultation with the appropriate review agencies.
- 8. Appendix A: Specific parameters are often cited in other ToRs for particular indicators (water quality, air quality, etc.). As this is has not been done, please include text to the effect of "specific parameters will be confirmed with review agencies during the EA."

Section 8 – Existing Environment and Potential Effects

9. There is no overt discussion of the "built" environment. What are the designated land uses adjacent to the existing landfill? Is there much industry or commerce? Discussion of this aspect of the environment, as defined in the EAA, could be rolled up into subsection 8.2 as long as "Built" is included in the heading.

Section 9 - Consultation Plan for Environmental Assessment

10. In your response to item 23 of the May 30, 2013 EASS comments, you indicated that the "direct" and "limited" consultation lists were for consultation during the ToR process and not the EA, during which there will be no differentiation between the two lists with all communities being consulted equally. Please ensure the ToR overtly states this in the Consultation Plan.

Section 10 – Modifying the Terms of Reference

11. More than simply "minor" modifications to the EA approach may arise during the process, and more elements may require modification than what is written. Additionally, there is no discussion should changes be made to the EAA or associated regulations and the flexibility in the ToR to address this. The section, as written, does not provide enough flexibility for modifying the ToR.

Section 11 – Other Required Approvals

12. Should the proponent wish to coordinate the EA process at the provincial and federal level (if applicable), you will wish to follow up with CEAA to ascertain whether or not a federal EA is required for this project.

Section 13 – Environmental Assessment Report and Submission

13. The text in the first paragraph is confusing, not making it clear to the reader if the requirements of subsection 6.1(2) apply to the EA Report or to the EA. Please revise the text accordingly. You may wish to have the text read "An EA Report will document the EA, which will be carried out in accordance with . . . "

The EASS is of the view that the additions and modification to the ToR outlined above should be undertaken. <u>Introduction</u>

As requested, I have reviewed the surface water related parts of the report submitted by the Municipality of Greenstone (the Municipality), entitled "Municipal Waste Disposal Plan -Environmental Assessment Terms of Reference" and dated June 3, 2013. This document details the draft Terms of Reference (TOR) that will become the framework for conducting an Environmental Assessment (EA) for a new waste disposal site as required under the Ontario EA Act.

The objectives of my review were to consider the draft TOR for completeness with respect to plans for assessing surface water impacts for the various alternatives and to ensure compliance with the EA Act.

Background

The current landfill in Geralton is out of compliance with the existing Certificate of Approval (C of A) for the site. It exceeds both the approved waste disposal area (footprint) and the approved waste disposal volume. The landfill will be increasingly out of compliance since waste disposal activities are ongoing at the site and the landfill is planned to continue to receive waste until 2014. Consequently, the Municipality is seeking to amend the existing C of A to allow them to continue to operate until approximately May 2014.

The Municipality has also begun the EA process to evaluate disposal options and locations for a new solid waste management site within the Municipality. They intend to develop a long term (20 to 30 year) solid waste disposal plan to immediately service the town of Geralton and to eventually service the other communities within the Municipality. The goal for the current study is to develop and receive MOE approval for a TOR in accordance with the EA Act. A new, long term plan for waste management for the Municipality is required since the current site exceeds its approved capacity and other nearby MNR landfill sites have been closed recently. As well, other facilities within the Municipality do not have the capacity to provide a

long term solution for solid waste disposal for the entire Municipality.

Study Area

The preliminary study area being considered for a new municipal landfill site extends to the boundaries of the Municipality of Greenstone.

Alternatives to be Evaluated

Seven various management strategies for residual waste will be considered during the EA process: thermal processing; biological processing; landfill expansion (horizontal and/or vertical); waste diversion and waste re-use; new landfill; export of waste; and the do nothing alternative.

Once the preferred management strategy (or combination of strategies) have been selected, then various alternative sites to carryout the preferred options will be explored. A constraint mapping process will first eliminate areas within the study area that are not suitable for consideration as preferred sites due to other interests or uses (ie: Aboriginal lands, provincially significant environments, etc.). The remaining sites will be evaluated using high level environmental, social, and economic analyses to determine a short list of candidate sites. These short listed sites will undergo additional screening and comparative evaluation to determine a preferred alternative. The preferred alternative and the selection process will be reviewed with the public and government review agencies and may be changed or further refined.

EA Studies and Evaluations

In order to conduct a thorough and complete evaluation and assessment of the various waste management strategies and alternative sites, a wide range of studies are planned which will provide information on all potential impacts of the various alternatives. These required studies and evaluations are planned to be continuously updated throughout the EA process. The list of planned studies in the draft TOR includes studies of surface water features and conditions and also the identification of potential effects, mitigation measures and net effects of the waste management strategies and the alternative site locations. The EA will include a detailed description of the environment within the study area and will also detail the potential impacts to the environment with recommended approaches to mitigate them. This will include aspects of the natural environment, the social/cultural features, and economic character within the study area.

The TOR lists the potential effects that are commonly associated with the various waste management strategies being considered and which may require mitigation measures. From a surface water perspective, this list includes potential impacts to aquatic habitats and the potential impact to local water quality if leachate and surface water runoff from the site is not managed properly. A full assessment of the potential impacts and associated mitigation measures will be conducted during the EA process.

Existing Environment and Potential Effects

The EA will include a detailed description of the environment within the study area and will also include potential impacts to the environment with associated mitigation strategies to address them.

Effects Monitoring

During the EA process a monitoring framework will be developed that considers all phases of the preferred alternative and will include monitoring to ensure compliance and to determine effects on the environment.

Consultation Plan for the Environmental Assessment Process

The TOR includes details on the various stakeholders that will be consulted during the EA process including government and agencies, the general public, and Aboriginal peoples. The consultation plan appears to be comprehensive and thorough and should ensure that all interested parties are afforded the chance to provide meaningful input to the EA at various points in the process. A full consultation and engagement program will be developed during the initial phases of the EA and a detailed record of all such activities will be maintained by the proponent.

Other Required Approvals

The proponent will identify all approvals required under the EA Act and the Environmental Protection Act (EPA) for each alternative being considered. Other approvals for the preferred alternative will be identified in the EA. Potential MOE approvals listed in the TOR include Stormwater and leachate management approvals, Permit to Take Water, Certificate of Approval for Air, and a Certificate of Approval for Noise.

Review and Discussion

The draft TOR provides a high level framework for the planned EA process for the new Greenstone Municipal solid waste disposal site. The draft TOR ensures that the EA will include a consideration of surface water impacts in various planned studies and will identify the primary sources of potential impacts to surface waters associated with such an undertaking.

The detailed description of the existing environment in the EA should also include baseline water quality data for the short-listed sites. The TOR should include specifics regarding how the necessary baseline data will be collected and be used to determine surface water quality and quantity effects for each of the alternatives to the undertaking. The TOR should also speak to other information that will be included in the EA including site specific information (ie: site history, other impacts, other uses), sampling and monitoring techniques, information collection and calculation methods, potential mitigation strategies, potential contingency plans to be considered, and potential water takings that may be required.

The TOR provides a comprehensive list of surface and ground water considerations that will be included as part of the alternatives evaluation of the EA process; the proponent plans to evaluate the type and severity of common surface and ground water impacts associated with the various alternatives as well as the potential for contamination or disruption to surface and ground water sources. In selecting a preferred site they will also consider the number of watercourses on or adjacent to the site, the potential for contamination or disruption to surface and ground water sources, and the effects on surface and ground water quantities or flow including significant sedimentation or soil erosion on or off site.

Given the high level of the draft TOR, the proponent has provided an adequate overview of surface water considerations that will be part of their EA process for the new Greenstone

Municipal solid waste management strategies and site location. Some additional details on baseline data collection techniques should be included in the final TOR as detailed above. As the EA process continues and the scope of the alternatives assessment is refined, the proponent is encouraged to continue to consult with and seek input from MOE regarding potential impacts to surface and groundwater sources and details of baseline studies.

If you have any questions regarding the above comments and recommendations, do not hesitate to contact me. The purpose of the preceding review is to provide advice to the Ministry of the Environment regarding the completeness of the draft TOR for the new Greenstone Municipal solid waste disposal plan with respect to the consideration of potential impacts to surface water features and the assessment of these impacts which is planned for inclusion in the EA process. Consideration should also be given to obtaining oral evidence of CHRs. For example, in many Aboriginal communities, an important means of maintaining knowledge of cultural heritage resources is through oral tradition.

If the answer is "yes" to any question in Step 2, an evaluation of cultural heritage value is required. If cultural heritage resources are identified, proceed to Step 3.

If the answer to any question in Step 1 or to questions 2-4, 6-8 in Step 2, is "unknown", further research is required.

If the answer is "yes" to any of the questions in Step 3, a heritage impact assessment is required.

If uncertainty exists at any point, the services of a qualified person should be retained to assist in completing this checklist. All cultural heritage evaluation reports and heritage impact assessment reports <u>must</u> be prepared by a qualified person. Qualified persons means individuals (professional engineers, architects, archaeologists, etc.) having relevant, recent experience in the identification and conservation of cultural heritage resources. Appropriate evaluation involves gathering and recording information about the property sufficient to understand and substantiate its heritage value; determining cultural heritage value or interest based on the advice of qualified persons and with appropriate community input. If the property meets the criteria in Ontario Regulation 9/06 under the Ontario Heritage Act, it is a cultural heritage resource.

[†] The 40 year old threshold is an indicator of potential when conducting a preliminary survey for identification of cultural heritage resources. While the presence of a built feature that is 40 or more years old does not automatically signify cultural heritage value, it does make it more likely that the property could have cultural heritage value or interest. Similarly, if all the built features on a property are less than 40 years old, this does not automatically mean the property has no cultural heritage value. Note that age is not a criterion for designation under the *Ontario Heritage Act*.

Introduction

The *Navigable Waters Protection Act (Act)* protects the public right to boat freely on waterways in Canada. The Act and its regulations:

- Require the pre-approval of structures (known as works) to be placed in, on, over, under, through, or across
 any navigable waters; and
- · Provide a legal framework for dealing with obstacles and obstructions to navigation.

The Act was updated on March 12, 2009. You can find the Act and its regulations online at: http://laws.justice.gc.ca/en/N-22/

Transport Canada's (TC) Marine Safety, Navigable Waters Protection Program works to:

- Protect the public right of navigation
- · Ensure safety for the shared use of Canada's waterways; and
- · Consider any impacts proposed works might have on the environment.

Navigable Waterways are any natural or man-made bodies of water (rivers, lakes, canals, etc.) that can be used by vessels to work, move freight, travel or enjoy pleasure activities – even if they were created for purposes other than navigation.

Get the Facts

What is a Minor Water?

Before starting construction, repairs or changes, owners should find out if their work is on a minor water or a navigable waterway. To determine if the waterway is minor you may refer to the *Minor Works and Waters (Navigable Waters Protection Act) Order* at http://www.tc.gc.ca/marinesafety/oep/nwpp/minorworks/menu.htm.

What is a work?

A work includes:

- · Any man-made structure, devise or thing, temporary or permanent, that may limit or prevent boating; and
- Any fill dumped into, or materials being dug from, the bed of navigable water that may limit or prevent boating.

What is a minor work?

Some works, called minor works, that <u>will not limit or prevent boating</u>, do not require TC approval. However, they must be placed, built and maintained according to the Minor Works and Waters (NWPA) Order. If they aren't, owners may be fined.

Minor works include:

Winter Crossings

· Submarine (underwater) Cables

· Water Intakes

· Aerial Cables

· Pipeline Crossings

· Erosion Protection Works

· Docks & Boathouses

Dredging





Get Your Project Approved

All works, except those listed as minor works under the *Order*, must be approved by Transport Canada. TC approval is proof that your planned work will not limit or prevent boating.

Contact TC for approval **well before your desired start date**. This will give us time to review your project and respond.

Remember: You must request and get any local building or other permits you may need **before** you begin your work.

Approval process

Step One: Apply.

- 1. Prepare a letter or application form that includes the information set out in Table 1, below;
- 2. Include a map and directions indicating the exact location of the worksite;
- 3. Include onsite, upstream and downstream photos of the waterway.
- 4. Mail your letter and supporting documents to:



Step Two: Wait for a response.

Transport Canada reviews proposed works based on information you provide, on-site assessment of the waterway and potential impacts to navigation. Once its review is complete, TC may issue an approval if the impacts to navigation can be lessened. The approval may include conditions you must meet.

The complete Transport Canada review can take some time because you may be asked to:

- · Provide more information;
- · Meet a Transport Canada official on site;
- · Deposit plans after confirmation to proceed,
- · Notify the public of the proposed work and allow one month for comments, and
- · Support an environmental assessment of the work as per the under *Canadian Environmental Assessment Act (CEAA)*.

Step Three: Receive a response.

If / When you receive an Approval Document, you must:

- · Read it carefully. It may include conditions that you must meet or time limits you must respect.
- · Keep a copy of the Approval Document on the work site at all times.
- · Meet all conditions of approval.
- · Expect a TC official inspect your site to make sure you are meeting all conditions of approval.
- · Write to TC when your work is done.





Table 2 - The Approval Process - Step by Step

- 1. Verify if the waterway is subject to the Minor Works and Waters (Navigable Waters Protection Act) Order or is a navigable waterway.
- 2. Verify if the work is subject to the *Minor Works and Waters (Navigable Waters Protection Act) Order* or is subject to application and review under the Act.
- 3. Complete and sign the application form and send it to Transport Canada with supporting documents listed in Table 1 (above) to the following address:

Transport Canada, Navigable Waters Protection Office 100 Front Street South, Sarnia, Ontario N7T 2M4

Include six copies of the drawings and key map showing location of the work site.

- 4. Be prepared to attend an on-site meeting with Transport Canada officials, or if asked, to provide more information.
- 5. If notified by Transport Canada, deposit one set of drawings and the supporting documents at the nearest Land Registry or Land Titles Office. Have one set of drawings certified by the Registrar and return it to Transport Canada with the Registrar's certificate, signature and deposit number.
- 6. If notified by Transport Canada, advertise your work project in the legal section, if possible. We will send you a sample ad, complete instructions and a blank Statutory Declaration of Advertising. When you have advertised your project:
 - Have the "Statutory Declaration of Advertising" witnessed by a Commissioner of Oaths and return it to Transport Canada with 1 copy of the advertisements.
 - · Allow one month for comments from the public before starting to build.

NOTE: The advertising process may have to be repeated if done too soon, if information is missing or if project plans change.


- 7. If asked, provide Transport Canada with any additional information needed for the environmental assessment.
- 8. When you receive your Approval from Transport Canada, read it carefully and note any conditions of approval. Also, look for any time limits for starting and completing the work as well as how long the Approval Document is valid.
- 9. Build your work, fulfilling all conditions of the Approval Document. Keep a copy of the Approval on the work site at all times during construction. Transport Canada officials may conduct on-site inspection(s) to ensure conditions are being met.
- 10. Notify Transport Canada in writing when the work is completed.
- 11. TC officials may inspect your finished work to make sure that it is built according to plan and meets the conditions of approval. **You** must:
 - Meet all conditions of approval;
 - · Take any measures required by the environmental assessment.
 - · Make sure to keep the work up to the standard of its approved plans.

Notes: You are responsible to:

- a. Complete the work according to plans approved by Transport Canada;
- b. Fulfill conditions of approval, as set out in the Approval Document issued by Transport Canada;
- c. Implement any environmental protection measures identified under Canadian Environmental Assessment Act.

NOTE: This guide explains the Navigable Waters Protection Act application and approval process. If anything in this Guide differs from the Act, comply with the Act.
